What is Ready, Set, Kindergarten at BCL?



- 6-week series of "enhanced storytimes"
- Each week focuses on a different readiness skill
- Talk to parents
- Brooklyn Public Library

Why do we do Ready Set Kindergarten at BCL?

- Local libraries + State Library = Early Learning Division of Oregon Department of Education (ODE)'s big picture
 - Ready to Read grants from the State Library
 - Early learning hub support at the State and regional level
- Libraries + Early Literacy = Kindy readiness
 - Establish a connection with local schools
 - Improve kindy readiness scores
 - Statewide letter name recognition upper 14.5, lower 12.1
 - Statewide letter sound recognition 8.2



School readiness domains of BSD

- Love of learning, curiosity, creativity
- Social & emotional development
- Language and communication skills
- Literacy
- Basic math concepts

The power of a FREE book!

- Ready to Read grant funds
- Parents facing unknown
- A bit scary experience for the child
- A book to read together all summer

Grant required 60 second ad, schools happy to partner for free books

Build relationships

Session one: TALK

Parent Takeaway

- Talk, Talk, Talk!
- Encourage child to be a "little scientist"
- Describe things
- Make predictions

- Color Hunt
- Cloud watching/popcorn ceiling
- "I Spy"



Session two: SING

Parent Takeaway

- Singing and chanting rhymes
- Helps hear smaller sounds in words
- Prepping child to sound out words

- Illustrated songs & rhyming books
- Sing & Dance
- Share poetry

Session three: Read



Parent Takeaway

- Read books your child enjoys (funny is queen!)
- You are your child's most important teacher.
- Reading should be a pleasurable experience.

- Character puppets
- Wordless picture books

Session four: WRITE

Parent Takeaway

- Children like watching you write
- Play with writing materials
- Practicing the alphabet

- "A is for Apple" game
- Family Mailbox
- Grocery List



Session five: Play





Parent Takeaway

- Play is how your child learns about their world.
- Children should have plenty of opportunity to play with other children.
- Play with math concepts

- Make a treasure chest
- Measure your world
- Shape art


"During the first couple of sessions,

Session six: Let's Make Friends





Parent Takeaway

- Talk to your child about emotions.
- Practice gross (big) and fine (small) motor skills.
- Use books to help with life changes.
- Practice listening skills—read aloud at home.

- Emotions chart
- Collage card
- Empathy activity


How we evaluate

- Parent Surveys Weeks 2 & 6
- Document observations, a.k.a. "fuzzy feelings"
- Verbal feedback from parents
- Staff document what went well and what we could change next year
- Staff Meetings to recap



Year two—what we changed

- Adapted the curriculum
- Added sessions to elementary schools.
- Used Counting Down to Kindergarten to book to make some adjustments.
