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Public libraries already use it to verify patron's service area for library cards




Assessor's data is public data, and GIS makes it easy to see. PortlandMaps.com is one of the most robust in the

state, and varied in its content. A random address has lots to use here... besides ownership, last purchase price, historical tax data, you can also find:

- Crime statistics
- Sewer maps
- Historical permits (scanned from originals)
- Survey plats, and more.

What are they?


Usually created by commercial entities for insurance or real estate purposes. They can show a number of features, including but not limited to

 For the state of Oregon two primary publishers of note are Sanborn Fire Insurance Atlases and Metsker Maps and Atlases

The Sanborn Fire **Insurance Maps of Oregon** are an extensive collection of detailed maps of 178 towns and cities in Oregon prepared for the primary use of insurance companies. The bulk of the maps were prepared in the 1880s through 1920s. The maps depict both business and residential areas and provide detailed information about the location and type of construction of structures.



Where to find them?

Many states (not Oregon) have some Sanborn atlases at the Library of Congress. Research libraries in Oregon have physical atlases, and some have access to the Digital Sanborn database by ProQuest. The latter is based on the black and white microfilm, even though the originals are rich in color elements. Historic Map Works descriptions has some sheets digitized as well.

Metsker Atlases


For over a century, the Metsker family produced approximately 300 county atlases and 400 county wall maps of Washington State, Oregon, Idaho, and Northern California until they closed the business in the early 2000s. They provide a singular window into the 20th century built environment in the Pacific Northwest.



How to use them?


Each atlas has an index page showing areas in a grid keyed to page numbers in the atlas. Other information that is helpful to have is the Township and Range of the location or street name you are interested in.


Atlases were produced in series (every few years) so that you can compare locations over time.



Compare these two images

Very few names stay the same; but some things do – road alignments are surprisingly resilient in the face of change as seen in this section of Washington County.






Where to find them?

In print:

U of O and Oregon State have significant collections, as well as Multnomah County, Oregon Historical Society, and historical societies and public libraries around the state may have locally-relevant volumes in their collections.

Online: Historic Map Works purchased the assets of Metsker Maps in 2010, and has digitized many relevant volumes. Researchgrade copies of maps can be viewed and ordered in print from their site at http://www.historicamapworks.com (this site may not be visible to those in a .edu domain).


EXAMPLE OF SANBORN FIRE INSURANCE ATLAS
















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
