The story of a 19th century woman and how she defied an entire town to provide an education for blacks girls.

Conn is a street thief who finds himself apprenticed to a wizard after he picks his pocket.

Roach, Mary. 2010. *Packing for Mars: the curious science of life in the void*. New York: W.W. Norton.

Space has never been so funny. Roach offers a look at what it takes to get into space and the people who make it happen.

Shusterman, Neal. 2010. Bruiser. New York: HarperTeen.

Brewster has an unpleasant power – whenever those he cares about are injured, the wounds instantly transfer themselves to his own body instead.

Smith, Charles R., and Shane Evans. 2010. *Black Jack: the ballad of Jack Johnson*. New York: Roaring Brook Press.

Picture-book biography of black boxer Jack Johnson who was famous in the early 1900s for being the first heavyweight boxing champion and for refusing to be treated differently because of his skin color.

Smith, Sherri L. 2008. *Flygirl*. New York: G. P. Putnam's Sons.

Based on the true lives of the Women Airforce Service Pilots in World War II. A black teenager who can pass as white fulfills her lifelong dream of being a pilot, but has to make hard decisions about her identity along the way.

Swanson, James L. 2009. *Chasing Lincoln's killer*. New York: Scholastic Press.

Learn the history behind the plot to assassinate Lincoln and the subsequent manhunt for the assassin.

Trine, Greg, and Rhode Montijo. 2010. *Invasion from planet Dork*. New York: Henry Holt and Co.

The newest book in the Melvin Beederman Superhero series. It is as fun and silly as Melvin Beederman fans have come to expect.

Underwood, Deborah, and Renata Liwska. 2010. *The quiet book*. New York: Houghton Mifflin Books for Children.

Beautifully illustrated picture book shows different types of quiet and the emotions behind them.

Whinnem, Reade Scott. 2009. *The pricker boy*. New York: Random House.
