

Literacy Development: Beginning Readers

Focus on Stage One of Reading Development (more info: https://www.theliteracybug.com/stages-of-literacy/)

- Initial reading, writing and decoding
- Typically between 6-7
- Learning how letters and sounds relate to print and spoken word
- Reading simple texts, using skills and insights to "sound out"
- Writing evolves from scribbling to letter strings
- Manipulate, trace, and hear the sounds of letters
- Ideal books have few words on each page, large type size, illustrations
- Incorporate listening to stories and reading informational text out loud

We all know this is a crucial time to support readers!


