



Creating collections, making connections: starting small and building as you go

What to collect?

Since we do not generally collect archival materials, making the pitch for joining Community Webs needed be focused and specific and require a small commitment of staff time. Even if you have just one website in your collection, if it is relevant to your community it can have impact. Our community is fortunate to have:

A local print and online newsletter

Since 2003 the independent monthly newsletter Cedar Mill News has chronicled the events and local items of interest in Cedar Mill and Bethany. Besides showing the changes in the community through local topics and advertisements, the newsletter features local history articles and land use development news, all of which offers rich content for archiving local community growth and change.

As we build our web archiving skills, we follow other related threads of community interest, including:

Citizen Participation Organizations (CPOs)

A unique facet of our county's government structure, CPOs and the related involvement venues for Washington County residents since the 1970s in support of Goal 1 (Citizen Involvement) under Oregon's land use planning system. Cedar Mill is the center and home of the original CPO1 and over the

About Cedar Mill & Bethany Libraries

Located just north of Beaverton in Washington County, our nonprofit community library association provides library services for 80,000 people in the most diverse county in the state. Within our suburban service area located outside city boundaries, there is no obvious history-oriented institution collecting the stories of our communities. The libraries do not host physical archives but have served as a community hub for information and engagement for over four decades, and have done other digital projects in the past in local oral history and library association history. This project continues that work in supporting our libraries' commitment to foster community engagement and lifelong learning.
