A QUICK NOTE ABOUT ACRONYMS

These are ubiquitous and change often in social services
They are used <u>ALL THE TIME</u> between workers and agencies (and yes, LIBRARIES DO IT, TOO!)

There are often acronyms that have different meanings ~ encourage
patrons to ask for clarification, and advocate for full-word use

EXAMPLES

- ♦ AR Applicant /Recipient from Medicaid, or other insurance carriers
- ♦ AR Accounts Receivable billing, state agencies



Meet Candace:

Her sister-in-law was diagnosed with Stage IV Adenocarcinoma - she wants to understand the prognosis, needs help with legal assistance for her brother, and wants to offer some help in getting their kids signed up for health coverage.

SCENARIO

An elder patron, who is a veteran with mobility issues, lives with adult daughter (who works part time as a caregiver in facility) and two minor grandchildren

one child has a developmental disability.

Adult daughter is inquiring about where to start looking for assistance.

This family might get benefits/services from:

- Veterans Administration medical and other offices
- Multnomah County Aging, Disability and Veterans Services
- ☐ School system Special Education
- Transportation
- □ SNAP nutritional help federal program administered within the state
- ☐ Case management it may be from different offices depending on person being served
- Low-rent program

Agencies and offices and services, oh my – not NEARLY exhaustive! --

BIRTH, DEATH, MARRIAGE, DIVORCE

- Birth certificates can be ordered by phone, mail, internet, in person
- Other records to be ordered include marriage, divorce, domestic partnership, death
- There are eligibility requirements for ordering
- ☐ Forms can be downloaded from web

- ★ Flu vaccination information
- ★ File complaint against facility
 - ★ Vaping and your health

Remember: <u>Birth certificates are the</u>

primary documents to prove identity

★ Non-US Citizen needing documents:

Oregon DMV - New Rules, New IDs

- ★ <u>Vehicle registration fees</u> are based on age and MPG of vehicle
- ★ Fees to renew or replace driver license/Real ID : \$26.00 up to \$70.00
- ★ Fees to renew or replace ID/Real ID: \$39.50 up to \$70.50
- ★ Disability placards can be requested with a form. There are several permit types available, <u>needing a physician signature</u>
- ★ Patrons may be best served by giving them the phone number and sharing that appointments may need to be made at DMV. PDX 503-299-9999; Salem 503-945-9000

HEALTHCARE FOR ALL

FAST STATS:

There are approximately 243,000 people in Oregon who are uninsured, about 6% of pop. (2020, OHA)

Mini breakdown:

- 15% Hispanics not insured
- Reasons not on OHP: cost, not eligible, worried about care quality
- If 80% of those 243k used subsidies, only 34k would be uninsured



Medicare & Medicaid &

Medicare - Aged 65 and over; some with disabilities; covers doctors and limited hospital help; there are programs to help pay premiums

Oregon Health Plan (OHP):

Medicaid - Historically, used by poor and those in nursing homes/facilities. There are MANY MORE options now.

What's the difference?

OHP - Coverage for low-income Oregonians; so-called Obamacare.


Oregon Unemployment

Claimants are responsible for following the law

Claimants can request a hearing if denied



ASK FOR HELP

SNAP - formerly known as Food Stamps



- Monthly benefit, accessed by a debit card
- 100% benefit paid by feds
- Farm Direct Nutrition Program
 - o WIC
 - Seniors

Average monthly benefit is \$125.00


Memorandum of Basic Detail:

Service Members need to have their <u>DD-214</u> that is the record of their military service and their discharge from service.

This document would also be needed to prove eligibility to be interred in a Veterans Cemetery.
