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

Legal Information vs Legal Advice

- License required to practice law (ORS 9.160)
 - o Protects the public from **exploitation and incompetence**
- Oregon courts broadly define practice of law to include "any exercise of an intelligent choice, or any informed discretion in advising another of his legal rights and duties." Oregon State Bar v. Security Escrows, Inc., 233 Or 80, 89 (1962)
- Even so, library reference staffers can do a lot to help patrons!


Legal information





- Facts about the law
- Legal authority from statutes, cases, or rules
- Authoritative print and online resources, including instruction on how to use these resources
- Relevant referrals

Legal





- Recommending a specific course of legal action
- Applying the law to a patron's specific legal problem

PRO TIP: If there is more than one answer to a question, it's likely a legal advice question!

Reference Interview Tips & Scripts

best practices for "answering" legal questions





- A legal reference interview is:
 - The same as any other reference interview →
 listen well, keep an open mind
 - Different from regular reference → you will not find "the answer" but rather resources/referrals





- Never start response to patron with what you
 CAN'T do
 - Don't hide behind a legal shield and say you can't help because you're not an attorney - offer effective assistance by connecting patrons with materials or services that potentially can help





- Use your listening skills
- Reframe the question into one you CAN answer
- Paraphrase the question back to the patron
- Watch out for "red flag" questions (legal questions are almost never "just a simple question")

PRO TIP: **Admit to ignorance** openly and often.





Reframe the question

Scripts

- My ex-wife won't let me see our son, and she wants to move with him to California. How do I stop her?
 - Reframe: I need information about out-of-state custody and visitation rights.
- Is it legal for me to leave my 7-year-old daughter at home alone?
 - Reframe: Does the law say anything about the age a child can be left alone?





- Reframe the question
 - I ended a lease and my landlord returned my security deposit. Now he says there's damage and I need to pay back some of the deposit.
 Can he do that?
 - Reframe: What does the law say about security deposit returns?
 - I'm in Oregon and want to file a small claims case. The company I'm suing is in New Jersey. Where do I file?
 - Reframe: I need information on small claims court in both Oregon and New Jersey.

Reference DON'Ts



- Never be invested in the case outcome
- Don't advise a patron
 about a particular legal
 course of action
- Never promise unreasonable expectations

Reference DON'Ts



- Don't select, fill out, or give advice on filling out legal forms
- Don't interpret or explain primary sources of law
- Don't recommend a specific lawyer

Reference DOs



- Promote effective and open access to legal information
- Direct patrons to resources
 on court procedures, court
 rules, federal and state
 cases and statutes
- Provide access to court-sanctioned legal forms and instructions

Reference



- Share as many meaningful options, resources, and referrals as possible
- Allow patrons to come to their own conclusions

Patroninstruction



- Teach patrons how to use indexes and tables included with statutes, cases, and rules
- Demonstrate how to search legal databases and navigate legal websites

Patroninstruction




- Offer word processing and printing guidance for completing online court forms
- Provide advice on how to effectively use Oregon
 State Bar's Lawyer
 Referral Service
- Inform and educate on county law library resources and services

The "Forms" Question

finding authoritative sources





Forms Pyramid

(ranked in order of where to look first)

- 1. Is there an official, Oregon court-sanctioned local or statewide form?
 - Check county circuit court website
 - Check Oregon Judicial Department <u>"Forms</u>
 <u>Center"</u>





Forms Pyramid

- 2. Is there a sample or template form in a state-specific legal practice book? (eg Oregon State Bar BarBooks, available at law libraries)
- 3. Can you find a sample form from a **reliable publisher**? (eg <u>Stevens-Ness Law Publishing</u>)






Forms Pyramid

- 4. Is there a sample form **on the web** (<u>use with</u> extreme caution be VERY wary of free forms!)?
 - Nolo Store (includes 'limited' Free Form Library; fee required for most products)
 - Findlaw/US Legal Forms (fee required)






PRO TIPS:

- 1. Remember the "forms pyramid"
- Unless official form is available, aspire to provide patron with 3-4 form "examples or templates" for patron to compare/contrast
- 3. If official form has **instructions**, refer patron to those, as they can often help patron decide if form is right for them.





PRO TIPS (con't)

- 1. There is **no court rule that requires** pre-printed forms.
- Many forms, even statewide-accepted forms, are customized for local courts. Never assume a form for one county may be used in another county.

LEGAL QUESTION/ PROBLEM

I need information on the emancipation process so I can help my 15-year-old niece get out of a bad situation.

DON'T SAY THIS

This Nolo book is on family law, so I bet between the two of us we can figure out the process!





LEGAL QUESTION/ PROBLEM

My son won't let me see my grandchild. His ex-wife told me there is a form I can file called a grandparent's petition for custody. Can you help me find it?

DON'T SAY THIS

Let's look on the Web – we can find just about everything there these days!





LEGAL QUESTION/ PROBLEM

My landlord took my name off the lease for the house I share with my two roommates. I need to find the law that says he can't do that.

DON'T SAY THIS

I can help you search for that statute; it should be easy to find!

- "What's the difference between a will and a living trust? Which is better?"
- "The other party in my lawsuit filed a motion to dismiss my complaint. How much time do I have to file a response?"
