

## Intellectual Freedom Fighters: Refighting a War Already Won

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In July 2022, our County Commissioners also tried to get involved and passed a resolution, which stated:

"It is requested that all sexually explicit content and/or materials within our Public Library Children Departments be clearly marked as sex education and relocated at minimum behind the counter and out of reach of prepubescent children. Further, any such access should first be at the discretion and with the authorization of the parent or legal guardian, without exception."

## THE COMPLAINTS (just some of many)

"The library is grooming children with these books."

"The Children's Department of the Chetco Community Public Library has sexually explicit materials available to prepubescent children."

"... sexually provocative materials are scattered throughout the Children's Department in various locations. There is a grouping of sexually graphic books on the lowest shelf possible, closest to the ground, making them easily accessible to children of all ages."

"Chetco Library Board of Directors voted to reject the expulsion of sexually graphic child grooming books."

"Kids can check out anything they want."




### THE FACTS

FACT: There is ONE section of books in the Junior section that contain information and drawings about bodies. There are a total of <u>SEVEN</u> books in this section. I was unable to find a single book elsewhere in the children's collection that depicts nudity. These are the actual books (book covers in next photos):














### THE FACTS



### **THE FACTS**




FACTS: Gender Queer by Maia Kobabe, the book that gets the most attention in this debate, is in the adult section of the library and always has been.

It is highly regarded and reviewed content for adults or older teens, and meets our standards for inclusion in the collection.

There are 4 copies in Coastline, they have been checked out a total of 30 times. One 17 year old, and the rest were 20 - 76. Average age: 47. (data from Nov 2022)

### From the Chetco Library's Code of Conduct:

Ensure children under the age of 10 are accompanied by a responsible caregiver 14 years or older at all times. Children under 5 should remain within sight of that responsible party at all times.

**FACT:** Children under 10 cannot checkout any item without a parent or caregiver, because they aren't supposed to be in the library without them.

**FACT:** Children under 5 should never be out of sight long enough to stumble into a section the parent/caregiver doesn't want them to be.

But can a 14-year old make these judgments?

Our assumption (and the legal assumption) is that if your child is at the library with a sibling or babysitter, then you have fully entrusted your children to their care.

FACT: It is not the library's role to act in the place of a parent.

State law (ORS) says the State Library Board establishes minimum conditions for every public library in the state.

The Oregon Secretary of State's rules (OAR) dictate library ALL public libraries must incorporate relevant American Library Association guidelines into their policies.

The Chetco Library abides by these rules, as we are required to do.



First: We are SAFER here in Oregon than many other states may be.

"The bar is VERY high to formulate a constitutional prior restraint on speech. Oregon caselaw does not examine this issue under Oregon's constitution. However, our state is even more protective of free speech."

## ORS 357.405 Minimum conditions for public libraries

TEXT

ANNOTATIONS

- (1) The State Library Board shall establish minimum conditions that a public library must meet.
- (2) The conditions established under this section must, at least:
  - Include financial support from public funds and regularly scheduled open hours; and
  - (b) Provide reasonable exemptions to libraries with service populations of 2,000 or fewer residents of the local government unit. [2019 c.158 §3]

#### **Oregon Revised Statutes**



#### Chapter 543

Division 10
ADMINISTRATION

543-010-0036

Official Recognition of Public Libraries

(1) The State Library Board will officially recognize those public libraries that become legally stablished under one of the methods described in ORS 357.216-286 or 357.400-621 and have met all minimum conditions.

- (2) Libraries, that have a service population of over 2000, shall meet the following minimum onditions:
- (a) Have at least half (50%) of its operational financial support from public funds.
- (b) Be open to the public a minimum of 20 hours per week.
- (c) Provide a collection comprising books, media, or electronic resources.
- (d) Offer free public access computers with Internet access.
- (e)Offer free public wireless Internet access (wi-fi).
- (f) Provide a website that enables local library users to access State Library of Oregon resources and services available to all Oregon residents.

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- (h) Have basic policies in place and accessible online for collection management, circulation, and patron confidentiality that incorporate relevant American Library Association (ALA) professional ethical codes, rules, and guidelines.
- (i) Provide basic services for reference and youth services.
- (j) Complete the annual statistical report as required under ORS 357.520 and OAR 543-010-0035.

#### OAR 543-010-0036(2)(h):

Have basic policies in place and accessible online for collection management, circulation, and patron confidentiality that incorporate relevant American Library Association (ALA) professional ethical codes, rules, and guidelines.

### **FEDERAL CASE LAW**

Many of these principles have been tested through lawsuits and appeals to state and federal Supreme Courts.

When a court makes its ruling, that ruling is used as legal precedent and treated as law unless the ruling is later overturned by a higher court.

The following images describe two directly relevant cases—they tell us exactly how to apply principles of the 1st Amendment.



### **FEDERAL CASE LAW**

Sund v. City of Wichita Falls, Tex (2000)

Based on a petition from community members, the library's governing body passed a resolution allowing certain "offensive" books to be moved from the children's section of the library to the adult book section.

The court found that the relocation of these books "violates Plaintiff's federal and state constitutional rights to receive information. The Resolution and the book removals burden fully-protected speech on the basis of content and viewpoint and they therefore cannot stand."



### **FEDERAL CASE LAW**

Island Trees Sch Dist v. Pico, eg. US Supreme Court (1982)

The Board of the school district gave instructions to remove certain books that they "characterized as 'anti-American, Anti-Christian, anti-Semitic, and just plain filthy." They also stated that it was "our duty, our moral obligation, to protect the children . . from this moral danger."

Students sued, alleging the Board's actions denied respondents their rights under the first Amendment. The Supreme Court upheld a lower court's ruling that the removal of these books violated the students' constitutional rights.



### **CONCLUSIONS**

The library has a statutory duty to enact policies that incorporate the relevant ALA guidelines.



### **CONCLUSIONS**

Oregon and federal free speech protections do not allow the library to remove, restrict, or censor books based on their content.




